City Council Approves Resolution to Place 1 Percent Income Tax on May 3* Ballot

Beavercreek City Council passed an ordinance adopting the provisions for a new Municipal Income Tax Code on December 10, 2021. After the passage of the tax code, city council unanimously passed the resolution to place the income tax on the May 3, 2022 ballot.

Some key points of the income tax ordinance being placed on the ballot:

- If approved, the income tax will be effective January 1, 2023
- If approved, the income tax will replace five existing property tax levies totaling 8.1 voted mills; the five existing property tax levies will be terminated for the tax year 2022 (approximately \$134 per \$100,000 of home value per year)
- Funding from the income tax will be used to replace the revenue generated by the terminated levies
- Funding from the income tax will be used to:
 - provide additional funds for general municipal operations, including public safety and public services
 - hire five additional police officers and five public service workers
 - complete capital and infrastructure improvements including streets, curbs, stormwater, and public facilities
 - provide and maintain municipal services, facilities and equipment
- Persons working in the City of Beavercreek, including non-residents, will be subject to the income tax; businesses earning income in the City are also subject to the income tax

- The tax code provides a 100 percent tax credit of one percent for Beavercreek residents who work outside Beavercreek and who pay one percent or more municipal tax where they work; Per the tax code, the income tax credit cannot be changed without first obtaining the approval of the change by the majority of the electors of the city at a general election
- Income includes (but is not limited to):
 - Residents wages, salaries, income and commissions
 - Non-residents wages, salaries and commissions
 - Lottery, sweepstakes, gambling and sports winnings
- Some types of income are exempt from taxation; a complete list of exempted income can be found at Section 39.03 of the Beavercreek Income Tax Code; examples of exempt income include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - Military pay, Reserve and National Guard pay
 - Intangible income: interest, capital gains, dividends
 - Social Security benefits, unemployment compensation pensions, retirement benefit payments, annuities, disability payments
 - Alimony and Child Support

Shall the Ordinance providing for a 1 percent levy on income for the purpose of providing revenue for general municipal operations, including public safety and public services, maintenance, equipment, municipal services and facilities, infrastructure, and capital improvements in the City of Beavercreek, Ohio, the passage of which will allow the city to terminate collection of existing property tax levies for the tax year 2022, which existing property tax levies include the Police Levy passed in 1981 (0.9 mills), the Police Levy passed in 1983 (3 mills), the Street Levy passed in 1983 (1 mill) (replaced 2008), the Police Levy passed in 1985 (1.2 mills), and the Street Levy passed in 2014 (2 mills), beginning January 1, 2023 be passed?

Bicycle Safety Tips from Beavercreek's Bikeway and Non-Motorized Transportation Advisory Board

Did you know the City of Beavercreek is designated as a Bicycle Friendly Community? The League of American Bicyclists honored the City of Beavercreek with the designation, which recognizes the city for its commitment to creating transportation and recreational resources that benefit its residents of all ages and abilities while encouraging healthier and more sustainable transportation choices.

Bicycling is a great way to get outdoors, exercise, explore the community, and reduce your carbon footprint. As the weather gets nicer, Beavercreek's Bikeway and Non-Motorized Transportation Advisory Board encourages residents to take a bike ride, but it's important for all cyclists to practice bike safety to keep themselves and others safe. The board would like to remind residents of the following bicycle safety tips.



Before using your bicycle, make sure it is ready to ride. You should always inspect your bike to make sure all parts are secure and properly working. Adjust your helmet and bicycle seat to ensure it fits. Always wear neon, fluorescent, or other bright colors when riding during the day or night. Also wear something that reflects light, such as reflective tape or markings, or flashing lights. Remember, just because you can see a driver doesn't mean the driver can see you.

Bicycles are considered vehicles in Ohio, meaning cyclists have the same rights and responsibilities as motorists to follow the rules of the road. When riding, always go with the flow of traffic and obey all traffic laws. Stay alert at all times and be predictable – ride in a straight line and signal your turns to others. Always look before turning and watch out for parked cars.



When walking or riding a bicycle on a sidewalk or along a crosswalk in Beavercreek, cyclists must obey all pedestrian signs and signals. Bicyclists must yield the right-of-way to pedestrians, and when approaching a pedestrian, cyclists should slow down and give an audible signal to alert of your presence before passing.

Most importantly, the Beavercreek's Bikeway and Non-Motorized Transportation Advisory Board hopes you have fun and enjoy your ride!

Right-of-Way and Utility Permits

Beavercreek City Council approved several changes to the city ordinances governing work within the city's public right-of-way that went into effect January 1, 2021. The public right-of-way includes driveway approaches and front ditches along the street. These changes affect who can obtain a permit and includes right-of-way and utility permits. The following items are required before any right-of-way or utility permit may be issued by the engineering division:

1. Anyone working within the right-of-way will need to be registered with the city's engineering division prior to applying for a permit.
2. To become registered, residents will need to complete the registration form, proof of liability and property insurance as well as a bond in the amount of \$10,000 that must be valid through December 31 of that year. Bonds will expire with the city and will need to be renewed on January 1 of each year.
3. No work may begin until registration is complete and permits have been approved by the city engineer.
4. All right-of-way and utility permits cost \$5 each.

The engineering division also has an online application and payment process for ease of doing business.

Groundbreaking Ceremony Held for Rebuilding of Tobias-Zimmer Barn

Beavercreek city leaders held a groundbreaking ceremony March 16 to celebrate the rebuilding of the Tobias-Zimmer Barn, which was destroyed by the 2019 Memorial Day tornadoes.

Members of Beavercreek City Council and the Beavercreek Historical Society were in attendance, along with the Tobias family and Bob Zimmer.

The historic Tobias-Zimmer Barn, located in Wartinger Park, was built in 1858. It was originally located in the area known as "The Big Woods," but later became the property of Bob and Agnes Zimmer, who donated the barn to the city in 1996.





Before the barn was destroyed, it was used as an educational space and historic representation of early life in Beavercreek. It also served as a gathering place for community activities and private events.

"This barn is an integral piece of our mission as the Beavercreek Historical Society," said Mark Wiley, president of Beavercreek's Historical Society. "Our mission is to preserve the past for future generations – to teach and demonstrate to our young people what our ancestors did and how they established the community of Beavercreek."

Following the tornadoes, the city's Parks, Recreation & Culture Division created a community survey asking Beavercreek residents if the city should rebuild a historically accurate replica of the barn or consider other options. The results revealed a majority of the community wanted to see the barn rebuilt.

"It's going to be wonderful to see this barn rebuilt," said Beavercreek Mayor Bob Stone. "I just want to thank our staff, the historical society, and Mr. Zimmer for all their hard work to get this rebuilt."

The city plans to host a ribbon cutting ceremony once the barn is completed, which is anticipated for summer 2022.







Beavercreek Police Welcomes Two New Officers to the Department

The Beavercreek Township Fire Department protects a greater than 50 square mile area within Greene County.

Five fully-staffed fire stations provide emergency medical and fire services within Beavercreek 24-hours a day. The departments provide fire suppression, emergency medical services (EMS), and fire prevention services to the residents of Beavercreek Township

and the City of Beavercreek. Each fire station has a fire engine and a medical unit available to respond to emergencies.

Established in 1946, the fire department has grown from two volunteer fire companies into a modern, suburban fire department staffed by a combination of 70+ dedicated full-time firefighters. Every day, a staff of up to 24 firefighters and paramedics located at the five fire stations provide 24-hour emergency response to any call for help.

The department also has a shift commander, two ladder trucks, a water tanker, a heavy rescue, a hazardous materials response unit, a communications unit, and reserve engines and medics. These apparatuses can be staffed in a variety of ways to meet the emergency needs of Beavercreek. Visit beavercreekfire.org for additional information.

Best Way to Get Rid of Sharps or Used Needles

According to the FDA, sharps is a medical term for devices with sharp points or edges that can puncture or cut skin. They may be used at home, at work, and while traveling to manage the medical conditions of people or their pets, including allergies, arthritis, cancer, diabetes, hepatitis, HIV/AIDS, infertility, migraines, multiple sclerosis, osteoporosis, blood clotting disorders, and psoriasis.

Some examples of sharps include needles, syringes, lancets or fingerstick, and auto injectors to name a few. It's important to know that used needles and other sharps are dangerous to people and pets if not disposed of safely because they can injure people and spread infections that cause serious health conditions. The FDA also recommends to never place loose needles and other sharps (those that are not placed in a sharps disposal container) in the household or public trash cans or recycling bins, and never flush them down the toilet. This puts trash and sewage workers, janitors, housekeepers, household members, and children at risk of being harmed.

Pet owners who use needles to give medicine to their pets should follow the same sharps disposal guidelines used for humans.

The FDA recommends a two-step process for properly disposing of used needles and other sharps:

1. Place all needles and other sharps in an FDA approved sharps disposal container immediately after they have been used.
2. Dispose of used FDA approved sharps disposal containers according to your community guidelines.

Where can FDA approved sharps containers be found? These strong, plastic containers are generally available through pharmacies, medical supply companies, and online. FDA approved sharps disposal containers are available in a variety of sizes, including smaller travel sizes to use while away from home.


If an FDA-approved container is not available, place used sharps in a strong, plastic container, like a laundry detergent or bleach bottle. The container should be leak-resistant, remain upright during use, and have a tight-fitting, puncture-resistant lid. Secure the lid of the container with heavy duty tape. Label the container with the word SHARPS on all sides in big block letters and discard in your trash if your trash removal company allows it.



What if your trash company won't pick up your sharps container? There are other methods of disposal available such as:

- Drop box or collection sites like the health department, pharmacies, and medical waste facilities.
- Mail-back programs
- Residential special waste pick-up services

Illegal Parking in Fire Lanes Poses Safety Issues

The Beavercreek Township Fire Department would like to remind drivers to not park in fire lanes.

We live in a time that people can have groceries, medications, and food delivered to them without getting out of their car. The COVID-19 pandemic made these services easier and more available. As a result, restaurants and big box stores began utilizing their parking spaces just for these services, so patrons do not have to get out of their car or walk-in for a pickup. Unfortunately, the fire department has also noticed more and more people using the fire lanes to park and go in for their “quick pick-ups.”

What is a fire lane? A fire lane is a road, a part of a road, or other passageway that allows passage and access for emergency

vehicles during fire, medical, and other emergencies.

So, what's the big deal? When vehicles are parked in fire lanes, they are blocking emergency passage and access to building entrances, emergency exits, fire sprinkler and fire alarm rooms, fire hydrants, fire department connections, utility shut offs, and other building features. When emergency passage and access to these items are blocked or delayed, it may impact life safety.

Due to this, parking in fire lanes is prohibited under the Ohio Fire Code (OFC). Citations for parking in fire lanes

may be issued as allowed by the OFC (4)503.4, (e)109.1.5 (R.C. 3737.42 (A)) (2017 edition)

How do I identify a fire lane? Fire lanes may be marked a couple of different ways within the Beavercreek community:



Therefore, the Beavercreek Township Fire Department reminds drivers not to park in a fire lane.

Stormwater

Stormwater runoff is precipitation from rain or snowmelt that flows over the ground. As it flows, it can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants and deposit them into a storm sewer or a body of water. Anything that enters a storm sewer flows untreated into the watershed we use for swimming, fishing, and drinking. We cannot afford to pollute and contaminate this watershed.

Sewers and storm drains are not the same thing. Wastewater from sinks, showers, and washing machines will travel through the Greene County Sanitary Sewer system to a wastewater treatment plant where it is extensively treated before being discharged. Surface or storm water, possibly containing grass clippings and leaf litter (storm water pollutants), enters storm drains and flows untreated to ponds, streams, and rivers. These storm water pollutants can have a diverse range of negative effects on the local watershed. Lawn waste, when blown into the street, can clog storm drains and cause drainage and flooding issues.

What can you do to protect water quality while keeping your yard maintained? Leave the clippings on the lawn or compost them. Be sure to sweep or blow clippings off paved surfaces and back onto the lawn. Please dispose of all trash in the proper place.



Homeowner Associations

Beavercreek Township does not enforce Homeowner Association (HOA) rules, nor does the township enforce deed restrictions. If a shed, fence, or a pool permit is submitted to the Community Development and Risk Department, and it meets the Beavercreek Township zoning standards, a permit will be issued regardless of the HOA rules that are in place. We strongly advise that the homeowner check with their HOA rules and regulations prior to erecting anything on their property.

Did you know that our Township Administrator meets with the Homeowner Associations or neighborhood groups in the Township? If you want to hear what is going on in the community and would like to have our Township Administrator at your next meeting call the Township Government Center.

Property Line Disputes

There are times when neighbors will have a dispute over the location of their property lines. This matter is especially prevalent when one of the neighbors is planning to put a fence on their property and there is a dispute over the placement of the fence. Unfortunately, this issue does not fall within the Community Development and Risk Department's authority. Property line disputes are strictly a civil matter between you and your neighbor. For a definitive answer to where the property line is located, contact a licensed surveyor.

Greene County Sanitary Engineering

Greene County Environmental Services is an essential recycling center assisting Greene County residents with proper recycling of their household materials and appliances.

Materials recycled at the facility include cardboard, paper, plastic bottles, metal cans, glass bottles and jars, and batteries. Unbroken fluorescent lamps and scrap metal can also be recycled. Residents may also drop off branches, leaves, and grass. The branches may not exceed 8 feet in length and 4 inches in diameter. Environmental Services also recycles household appliances that contain refrigerant. Please call the office to schedule a drop-off of these units.

Liquid latex paint is accepted on Mondays and Saturdays during operating hours. Our staff will assist you with recycling paint from your residence. It is recommended to manage household latex paint separate from household hazardous waste due to the volume of customers utilizing the facility during the household hazardous waste drop-off.

Accepted items include: acids and cleaners; aerosol spray cans; antifreeze, gasoline and kerosene (up to five gallons); herbicides and pesticides; putty and adhesive; stains, varnishes, and paint thinner; oil-based paints.

Unaccepted items include: motor oil; electronics; small household appliances; computers and accessories; televisions; pharmaceuticals; ammunition; explosives.

Are you looking for some fun activities this summer? Look no further than your own backyard! The Beavercreek Parks, Recreation & Culture Division maintains several great parks and amenities throughout the City of Beavercreek. With 23 parks, 3 bike hubs, 16 playgrounds, and more than 380 acres of park land, there is something for everyone to enjoy!

If you are looking for a great place to go for a hike and enjoy nature, the Tilt Trail at Fox Run Park meanders through a mature forest with several enormous tree species. Dominick Lofino Park offers a paved walking trail around the 7-acre fishing lake, in addition to natural surface hiking trails through the wooded section of the park. Within Rotary Park, you will find a trailhead to the Spotted Turtle Trail through the Beaver Creek Wetlands Corridor. Also, be sure to visit Virgallito Park to check out the recently completed walking path around the perimeter of the park and its new pedestrian bridge.

Beavercreek is also home to a spectacular

9/11 Memorial that pays tribute to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice on that tragic day more than 20 years ago, while displaying a large piece of steel from the twin towers. Just up the street is Beavercreek's Veterans Memorial, honoring veterans in our community. If you enjoy history, visit the Alpha Mill along Creekside Trail and Wartinger Park to admire cabins that date back to the 1800s. Crews are working to rebuild the Tobias-Zimmer barn that was destroyed in the 2019 Memorial Day Tornadoes. That project is expected to be completed this summer.

Beavercreek's parks also offer many great playgrounds, but no playground piece is more renowned than the metal slide at Shoup Park. For many years, this slide has brought joy, laughter and great memories to children throughout the area who slide down the long slide on wax paper.
