City of Beavercreek's Winter Weather Preparedness

As winter approaches, the City of Beavercreek's Public Service Division is gearing up to tackle the challenges that come with the season. The division has the vital task of implementing a winter weather plan that combines safety, environmental consciousness, and fiscal responsibility for 577 lane miles of roadways throughout the city.

Pretreatment with Brine Solution: The city takes proactive measures to reduce the challenges posed by winter weather. A key strategy is pretreating the roads with a brine solution, an environmentally friendly approach that reduces the need for excessive road salt usage during and after snow and ice events. This approach not only saves money but also protects the environment by reducing salt runoff into nearby waterways.



Prioritizing High-Traffic Roadways: Once winter weather arrives, the city shifts its focus to road management. To ensure the safety of all travelers, the public service division prioritizes treating high-traffic

roadways, including Beaver Valley Road, Kemp Road, Col. Glenn Hwy., North Fairfield Road, State Route 835, Indian Ripple Road, Dayton-Xenia Road, North Fairfield Road, and National Road. By keeping major roads clear, the city ensures that essential services and commerce can continue to operate smoothly.

Neighborhood Snow Removal Efforts: Once the main routes are clear, Beavercreek's dedicated snowplow drivers focus on city neighborhoods. Managing more than 570 lane miles of roadways throughout the city is no small task, requiring the tireless efforts of 21 skilled drivers who

work round the clock to keep the streets safe and passable for all residents, even during the harshest winter conditions.

Safety Tips for Winter

Travel: Winter weather can be unpredictable, and traveling during a snow event demands extra caution. Here are some safety tips:



- 1. Maintain a Safe Distance:** When encountering a snowplow, maintain a safe distance to protect yourself and your vehicle. Snowplows make sudden stops, turns, and other unexpected maneuvers.
- 2. Slow Down:** In snowy or icy conditions, reduce your speed. Slower driving provides better control and reaction time.
- 3. Plan Ahead:** If you must travel during a winter event, allow extra time to reach your destination. Rushing in snowy conditions can lead to accidents and delays.

Protecting Your Mailbox: Residents are encouraged to ensure their mailboxes are secure. While snowplows typically don't touch mailboxes, the force of snow thrown from a plow can knock down an unstable mailbox. If your mailbox is damaged during a snow event, contact the City of Beavercreek Public Service Division at publicservice@beavercreekohio.gov or (937) 427-5540 for assistance.

The City of Beavercreek's Public Service Division is committed to providing a safe and efficient winter travel experience for the community. The division's winter weather plan is all in an effort to help keep those on the road safe, even during the coldest months of the year.

Beavercreek City Council in Action

Beavercreek City Council encourages residents to attend their meetings, which are held on the second and fourth Monday of each month at 6 p.m. at City Hall, located at 1368 Research Park Drive. During these meetings, council passes legislation and authorizes budget expenditures related to the management and operation of the city, as well as the health, safety, and wellness of Beavercreek residents. Some of the agenda items recently approved by council include:

- Ordinance 23-19, which makes necessary additions, deletions, and changes to the city's zoning code to stay up-to-date with the latest trends and to ensure the ability to maintain and guide developments as intended by city council. One change included the allowance of more fence options throughout the city.
- Resolution 23-46, which authorizes the City's Parks, Recreation & Culture Division to apply for grants through the Ohio Department of Transportation's Specialized Transportation Program. If granted, the Parks Division plans to utilize the funds for the Beavercreek Senior Center to purchase a new transportation vehicle and for vehicle maintenance to address the center's growing transportation needs.
- Ordinance 23-22, designed to deter individuals and companies with malicious intent from purchasing land near Wright Patterson Air Force Base (WPAFB). The ordinance mandates that individuals and companies seeking zoning permits within the City of Beavercreek certify that they are not subject to review by the Committee on Foreign Investments in the United States (CFIUS). If an applicant is subject to CFIUS review, they must provide appropriate documentation before the city will issue a permit.
- Resolution 23-51, which authorizes the City's engineering division to apply for a grant through the Dayton Regional Priority Development and Advocacy Committee to upgrade the existing interchange at Grange Hall Road and I-675 to a full interchange.



All city council meetings are open to the public, and agendas for every meeting can be found on the city's website at beavercreekohio.gov. If you are unable to attend a meeting, all city council meetings are recorded and posted on the city's YouTube channel and aired on the city's public access channel. Every meeting includes time for public comment, where residents have three minutes per person to address the council. Please note that this time is not in a question-and-answer format. Residents may also reach out to the council through the contact information listed on the back of this newsletter.

Residents Graduate from Inaugural City of Beavercreek Citizens Academy



Beavercreek City Council and staff celebrated the graduation of the first-ever City of Beavercreek Citizens Academy in September 2023. Over the course of six weeks, graduates attended weekly classes that provided behind-the-scenes access to city programs and services. The program offered Beavercreek residents and business owners an opportunity to gain knowledge about city departments and divisions, including finance, engineering, public service, parks, planning and development, police, and more. The sessions were interactive and include activities such as facility tours, exploring equipment, and demonstrations.

"This academy has provided an invaluable bridge between our community and the inner workings of our local government," said Pete Landrum, city manager. "Through these engaging sessions, our residents and business owners have gained a deeper understanding of the city's programs and services."

"It's important to city council to have an engaged and well-informed community," said Mayor Bob Stone. "This academy supports that mission and helps foster meaningful relationships between city council, city staff, and the community."

The city plans to offer another Citizens Academy in the fall of 2024. Registration details will be announced on the city's website and social media platforms.

Paving the Way for City Road Projects

Throughout 2023, the City of Beavercreek's Engineering Division completed multiple roadway projects aimed at alleviating traffic congestion, enhancing pedestrian travel, improving safety, and upgrading road conditions throughout the city.

In the spring, the city celebrated the completion of **McGrath Way**, which established an additional connection between North Fairfield Road and Dayton-Xenia Road. This new road will provide fresh opportunities for land development in the area and ease traffic congestion at the primary intersection of North Fairfield Road and Dayton-Xenia Road. Furthermore, a widening project on **Shakertown Road** was successfully finished in October 2023. This project encompassed the addition of a center turn lane, enhancements in drainage, and the extension of pedestrian access through the installation of pathways on both sides of the roadway. Another key accomplishment in 2023 was the expansion of a section of **Factory Road**, spanning from Creekside Trail to Nutter Park Drive. This involved widening the road to three lanes, installing new curbs, storm sewers, and extending a pathway leading to Creekside Trail.



Currently, the city is working with the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) to reconstruct the bridge along Factory Road. The new design includes an extra lane to align with adjacent pavement widths, which is expected to alleviate traffic congestion and improve traffic flow. Furthermore, the project will raise the bridge's elevation to mitigate flooding impacts during larger storm events. Additionally, it will involve the construction of a pedestrian path alongside the bridge, connecting the Creekside Trail to the pedestrian crossing established by ODOT during the Superstreet project.



The ongoing widening project along **Grange Hall Road**, between Kemp Road and Summerfield Drive, will continue into the winter months. This project aims to widen the road to three lanes, incorporating pedestrian facilities, curb enhancements, and drainage improvements. During the winter months, temporary pavement will be in use while the contractor installs storm sewer structures as weather permits. It is anticipated that these improvements will be completed by the summer of 2024.

The city received more than \$4.3 million in grants to completed these road projects. The city's engineering division works diligently to apply for grants in an effort to maximize the utilization of local tax dollars and undertake additional road projects within the city.

In addition to the widening initiatives, the city has also completed various road resurfacing projects, with the most significant ones being along **North Fairfield Road**, extending from Lakeview Drive to Pentagon Boulevard/New Germany-Trebein Road, and **Grange Hall Road**, from Shakertown Road to Indian Ripple Road. The city has also resurfaced 11.25 centerline miles of residential roadways and replaced 15,037 linear feet of curbs.

The city's engineering division appreciates patient drivers who navigated these work zones while these improvements were under construction. For additional information on capital improvement projects happening in the city, visit beavercreekohio.gov/engineering.

Beavercreek Police Department Retirements, New Hires, and Promotions

Recent personnel changes have occurred within the Beavercreek Police Department, including retirements, a rehire, a new officer hire, and the promotion of two officers.

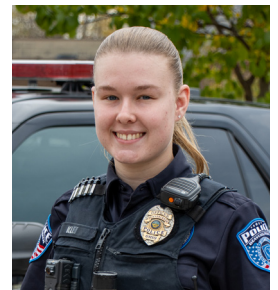
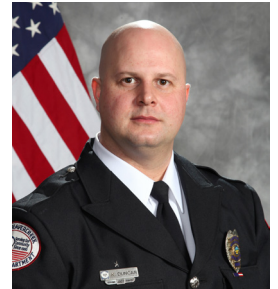
Officer Don Cole retired on August 26, 2023, after serving with the agency for 28 years. Officer Cole began his career with the Beavercreek Police Department when he was sworn in as a patrol officer on January 23, 1995. Throughout his career, he held various positions, such as evidence technician, field training officer, DARE officer, bike patrol officer, active threat response instructor, and police academy instructor. He was also a member of the Agencies for Combined Enforcement (ACE) task force and a long-time member of the Regional Emergency Response Team (RERT). Don returned to the department as a records clerk on August 28, 2023 filling the third records clerk position left vacant by a retirement in 2022.

Officer Keith Duncan retired on September 1, 2023, after 16 years of service as a patrol officer. Hired in March 2007, Officer Duncan was part of the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT), served as an Officer-in-Charge (OIC), RERT member, and volunteered with the ACE Task Force's clandestine meth labs decontamination team. Officer Duncan received several department letters of recognition and was the 2014 recipient of the Knights of Columbus Council 7981 Blue Coat Award.

Sergeant David Holley retired with 17 years of service on September 15, 2023. A United States Army Veteran, Sgt. Holley joined the department in August 2006. He served in the patrol division as an evidence technician, Technical Crash Investigation (TCI) unit member, CIT member, and RERT negotiator. In 2017, he became a detective in the investigations division. He also became a certified polygraph examiner and drone pilot. Sgt. Holley received several accolades throughout his career, including numerous department letters of recognition, a 2013 Meritorious Service Award, 2016 Department Commendation, and the 2021 Blue Coat Award from the Knights of Columbus Council 2981.

The department expresses its gratitude to Officers Cole and Duncan and Sergeant Holley for their dedicated service to the law enforcement profession and the Beavercreek community.

On September 11, 2023, the agency welcomed Megan Klei as its newest patrol officer. Officer Klei is a 2018 graduate of Ross High School in Hamilton, Ohio, and earned an Associate's Degree in Natural Resources for Law Enforcement from Hocking College in 2020. She obtained her Basic Peace Officer Academy (OPOTA) certification from Butler Tech in May 2021. Officer Klei joins the department from the University of Dayton Police Department, where she was employed as a police officer since 2021. The department is excited to welcome Officer Klei to the Beavercreek Police family and looks forward to her long and successful career with the agency.



Officer Jacen Millette Honored with Award by The Greene Optimists Club



Beavercreek Police Department Officer Jacen Millette was honored with The Greene Optimists Club's Respect for Law Enforcement Award in October 2023. The Optimists Club annually presents this award to officers who have demonstrated exceptional service and made significant contributions to the betterment of the Beavercreek community. The club's mission revolves around providing positive programs and activities, and Officer Millette embodies their core principle: "to aid and encourage the development of youth, in the belief that giving of oneself in service to others will advance the well-being of mankind, community life, and the world."

Officer Millette has been dedicated to serving others since his days at Beavercreek High School. As a student aide, a member of the BHS Peer Listening Group, and a participant in Young Life, he consistently engaged in activities that provided help and benefits to others. On September 25, 2023, Community Engagement Officer (CEO) Kris Brownlee and Detective Sean Williams were promoted to the rank of sergeant. Since his hire in 2012, Sgt. Since 2021, he has served as the CEO, responsible for facilitating community policing objectives and practices within the community, including Safety Town, Citizens Police Academy, and National Night Out.

Sgt. Williams was hired as a patrol officer in 2005 and served in the patrol division as a bike officer and CIT member. In 2015, he was assigned to the ACE Task Force, where he served as a detective, team leader for tactical operations, and FTO for new team members. Sgt. Williams returned to the Beaver Creek Police Department's general assignments section of the investigations division in January 2023. He also serves as an agency instructor and is a member of the RERT team. These promotions fill vacancies created by recent retirements in the operations division, where Sergeants Brownlee and Williams have both been assigned as patrol supervisors.

Beavercreek Township Fire Department's Open House: A Day of Demonstrations, Competitions, and Fire Safety Education

The Fire Prevention Week Open House held this year was a tremendous success for the Beavercreek Township Fire Department. The event featured an array of displays and scheduled demonstrations, including the impressive arrival and departure of Miami Valley's Careflight and their Mobile Intensive Care Unit (MICU), which never fails to captivate both the members of the fire department and those in attendance.

One of the notable demonstrations showcased the fire department's expertise in vehicle extrication. Spectators watched in awe as the department's skilled fire crews utilized various tools to stabilize a car and cut open the roof, demonstrating how they could rescue someone trapped inside.

Adding excitement to the event were K9 demonstrations presented by both the Green County Sheriff's Department and the Fire Department. The highly trained dogs showcased their abilities, ranging from locating lost individuals to conducting drug searches, drawing large crowds who marveled at their skills.

The highlight of the open house was the annual chili cook-off, where community members sampled a variety of chilis and cast their votes for their favorite recipe. Firefighters, Auxiliary members, and even some Township staff participated in the contest. The winning chili this year was Chili F, prepared by Firefighter John Ostrowske, earning well-deserved recognition.

Furthermore, this year's Fire Prevention Week carried the theme, "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention." The Fire Prevention Bureau took the opportunity to educate attendees through a cooking demonstration, highlighting both what not to do and best practices when cooking. The event served as a valuable reminder of the importance of fire safety in our everyday lives.

Here are important tips to remember when you're cooking:

"Cook with Caution"

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire — oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.





Emergency Response Excellence: S.E.R.T Training Ensures Swift Medical Care in Challenging Situations

In September, the Beaver Creek Township Fire Department, in collaboration with Kettering Health Network's main hospital EMS coordinator, participated in the annual S.E.R.T (Surgical Emergency Response Team) training alongside the Kettering Health MICU (Mobile Intensive Care Unit) and the Medflight 8 crew.

What is SERT? The Surgical Emergency Response Team (SERT) is a specialized unit comprising a trauma surgeon, advanced practice provider, surgical technician, and other hospital staff. They offer advanced surgical care at the scene of accidents for individuals who cannot be extricated and transported to a hospital promptly. These situations include cases where emergency amputation is necessary, instances of uncontrollable blood loss, or the urgent administration of blood products.



During the training session, participants engaged in a simulated scenario involving a two-car motor vehicle accident with a semi-trailer on a highway. The incident involved three victims: an unresponsive infant and two adults in need of extrication. One of the patients had their arm (cadaver) trapped underneath the vehicle, posing a unique challenge. Since conventional means were ineffective in freeing the pinned extremity, the emergency response teams had to seek assistance from the SERT team at Kettering Health.

In a real-time exercise, the cadaver arm was amputated, allowing the patient to be successfully bundled and removed from the wreckage. Care was then seamlessly transferred to the Medflight crew. Notably, these training exercises required the participating crews to physically draw up the correct amount of medication from water-filled vials, emphasizing the importance of practical skills under stressful conditions.

This collaborative training effort showcased the vital role of coordinated response teams in handling complex and high-stakes emergency situations, ensuring that individuals in dire need receive swift and effective medical care.





2022 Financial Results: What does it cost to run Beavercreek Township and how are those costs paid?

Beavercreek Township is required by law to adopt a budget each year and cannot spend more than that total amount. This includes all funds for the fiscal year ending December 31st. These numbers are adopted by the Board of Township Trustees. The Township financial statements are audited bi-annually by an independent auditor. The most recent financial audits for 2021 and 2022 received a clean opinion.
