


Financials



Financial Summary

The 2023 financials returned to a more traditional year of revenue and operating expenses after seeing an irregular year in 2022. In 2022, revenue and expenditures saw a significant increase associated with the land acquisition for Spring House Park.

In fiscal year 2023, the largest share of revenue, or \$1.74 million, is generated through the 1.2 mill property tax levy. Additionally, the Parks Division obtained over \$676,000 in grant funding in 2023. Personnel costs account for the largest share of operating expenses at \$1.53 million of the total \$3.21 million in parks expenditures.

2023 Division Accomplishments

Senior Center

- Annual memberships are again at an all-time high; over 2,100 members by end of 2023
 - Total 503 members added in 2023
- The center offered more activities during evenings and weekends than ever before including pickle ball, yoga, meditation, arts & craft classes, etc.
- Record number of transportation trips: 11,440 trips in 2023 (9,000 in 2022)
 - 1,435 wheelchair trips (977 in 2022)

Recreation

- Event highlights:
 - Partnered with Police on National Night Out
 - Offered two children's entertainment puppet shows
 - Summer concert series welcomed over 1,700 people
 - Nearly 1,500 attendees at Winter Welcome at Wartinger Park
- Program highlights:
 - Adult softball women's league offered for first time
 - More summer camps than before with specialty camps (multiple offerings each week during summer)
 - Variety of new classes and programs including tree hike, line dancing and more

Parks

- Spring House Park
 - With the assistance of the community, Park Advisory Board, and City Council selected the name of this new parcel
 - Master plan completed with input from over 2,220 respondents
 - Plan meets most of the unmet needs of the community identified in the 2019 Parks Master Plan
- Improved Connectivity
 - Hiking trail development at Cinnamon Ridge Park and Spring House Park
 - Walking path completed at Gerspacher Park
 - Bridge replaced at Merrick Park
- Park Improvement Projects
 - Replaced roofs on all cabins at Wartinger Park
 - Renovated ball diamond 1 infield at Rotary Park
 - Stocked pond at Dominick Lofino with minnows
 - Installed gravel parking lot at Spring House Park
 - Landscape beds improved in Senior Center parking lot
 - 30 new trees planted
 - 700 yards of playground mulch installed at 9 playgrounds

Volunteerism 2023

By the Numbers:

- Senior Center Volunteers
 - 160 volunteers
 - 29,331 volunteer hours
 - Transportation, front desk, kitchen, instructors/activity leaders, library, fitness, photos, events, etc.
- Parks Volunteers
 - Over 244 volunteers
 - 600 volunteer hours
 - 15 projects completed
- Recreation Volunteers
 - 64 volunteers
 - 331 volunteer hours
 - Volunteers helped at 12 different in-person events
 - Individuals and group volunteers gave time in a variety of roles, including:
 - Archery Instruction
 - Event set-up and facilitation
 - Photography
 - Holiday decorating

According to the Independent Sector, the 2023 estimated value of a volunteer is \$31.80 per hour.

Volunteers for the Parks, Recreation & Culture Division worked a total of 30,262 hours with an estimated value of \$962,332

2024 Goals and Objectives

In 2022, City Council adopted new strategic priorities. Goals and objectives for 2024 have been adopted in line with several of these priorities.

Family Friendly Parks

1. Quality Parks and Recreation Facilities: Provide a variety of parks that take advantage of existing assets and develop modern facilities that serve as destinations for community recreation.
 - a. Replace playground at Walnut Grove Park
 - b. Make ADA improvements at park and recreation facilities in accordance with the ADA transition plan
2. Improved Connectivity: Increase connectivity between parks, nature and the community.
 - a. Replace pedestrian bridge at Stafford Park
 - b. Install paved perimeter walking path at Virgallito Park with neighborhood access to Cold Springs Dr.
3. Attractive Programs and Quality Experiences: Offer a variety of recreational programs and events for users of all ages and abilities.
 - a. Seek additional partnerships (i.e. Tree Advisory Board, local universities, Master Gardeners, etc.) for two additional (new) nature programs
 - b. Offer two programs specifically geared towards younger adults
 - c. Offer one partnership program with Beavercreek Community Theatre
 - d. Make specific improvements to two events and communicate those to attract participation by individuals with disabilities
 - e. Add one new recurring program that runs in the evening at the Senior Center
 - f. Combine the garage sale and health fair to boost attendance and increase scope of these events



2024 Goals and Objectives

Right Sized Workforce and Diversified and Sustainable Revenue

1. Effective Management and Efficient Operations: Utilize efficient, proactive management of staff and fiscally sound strategies to promote an informed population and a safe environment at parks.

- a. Create career development plan for all recreation and senior center staff
- b. Update the employee training matrix and policy
- c. Recruit ten new volunteers in transportation
- d. Create and implement a strategy for reducing the number of trip denials in the transportation service
- e. Review and update the Cost Recovery Plan
