It has been a privilege to serve under Chief Fiorita's leadership. His unwavering commitment to our department and the Beavercreek community throughout his 33-year career leaves a lasting legacy.

Police Chief Jeff Fiorita Retires After 33 Years of Service

After 33 years of service, Beavercreek Police Chief Jeff Fiorita has retired. Joining the department in 1992, Fiorita rose through the ranks from patrol officer to chief, holding various key roles including detective, polygraph examiner, and commander of both the Special Services and Operations Divisions. He became deputy chief in 2020 and was sworn in as chief in 2021.

Throughout his career, Chief Fiorita has pursued and attained a high level of professional achievement and professional excellence. He completed Police Executive Leadership College (PELC) in 2009 and the Public Safety Leadership Academy (PSLA) in 2014. In 2019, he earned the designation of Certified Law Enforcement Executive (CLEE) and graduated from the United States Department of Justice FBI National Academy. He is a member of several professional organizations and has

received both community and departmental recognition, including the Knights of Columbus Blue Coat Award and a Chief's Award of Merit.

"It has been a great privilege to work alongside some of the finest officers in this department," said Fiorita. "I am thankful for the relationships I've built with members of this department, colleagues in other city departments, and the citizens of this incredible community. Thank you for the opportunity to serve as Chief of Police. It has been an honor to protect and serve this wonderful community."



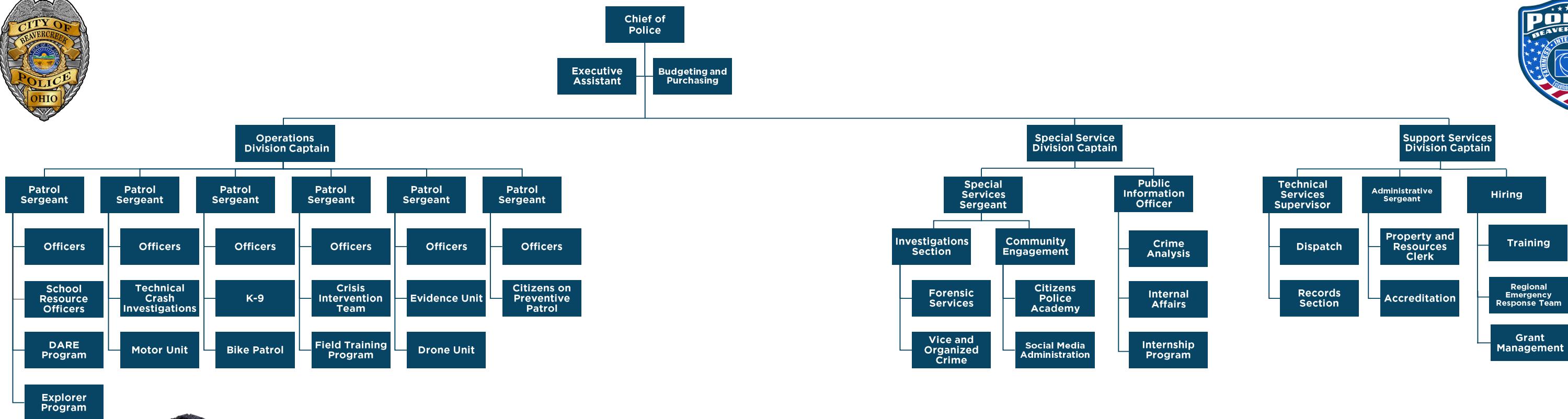
Beavercreek Police Department Earns CALEA Reaccreditation



In 2024, the Beavercreek Police Department earned reaccreditation from the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA), reaffirming its commitment to professional excellence. First accredited in 1999, the department must apply for reaccreditation every four years.

To maintain this distinguished status, agencies must meet 480 rigorous standards covering policy, administration, operations, and support services. The process includes an in-depth self-assessment, independent evaluation, public feedback, and structured interviews, with final approval granted by a 21-member commission.

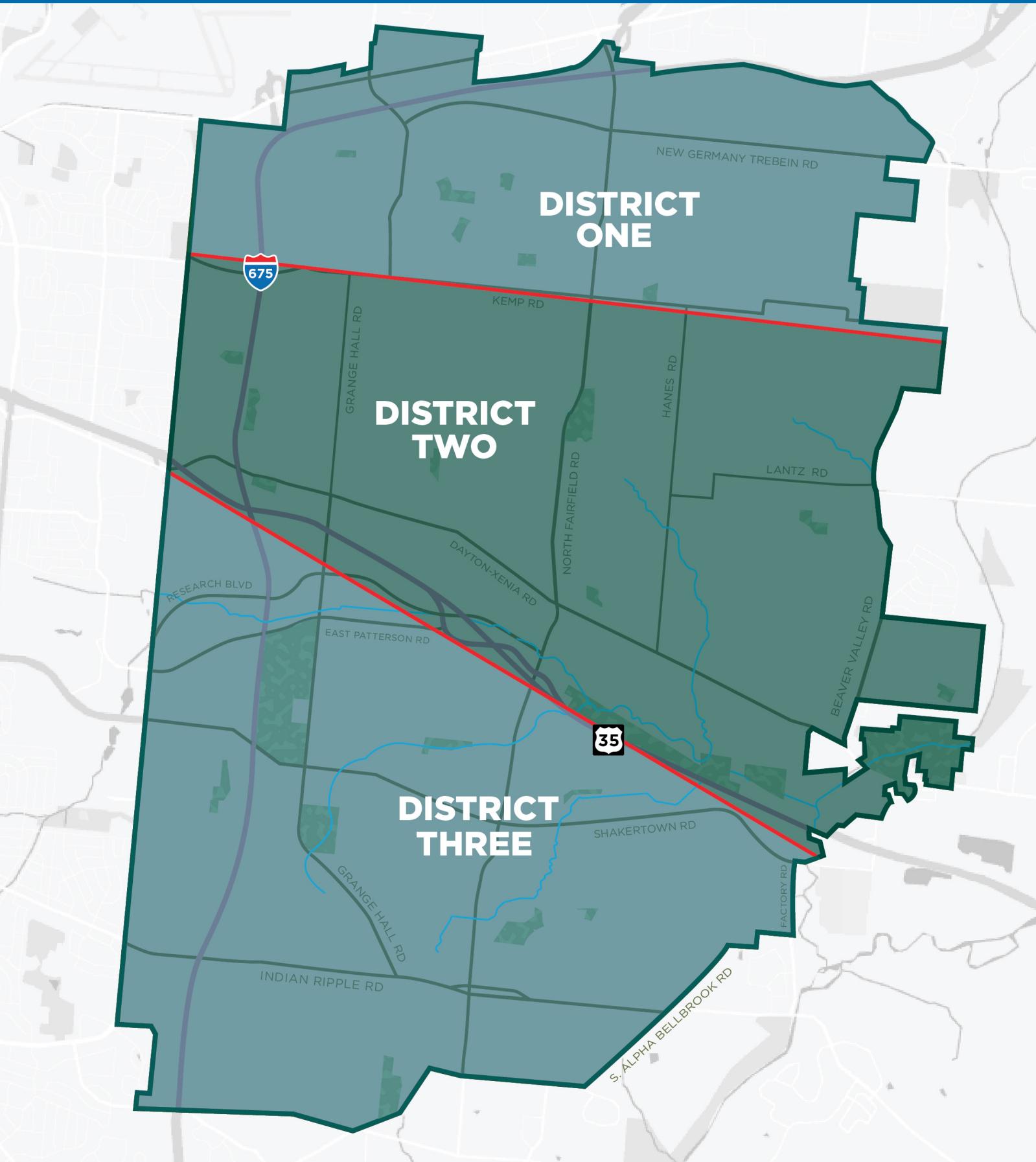

Captain Scott Molnar

Captain Scott Molnar has served with the Beavercreek Police Department for 24 years. He oversees the Special Services Division, which includes the Detective Section and Community Engagement functions. Captain Molnar also serves as the Public Information Officer, Internal Affairs Administrator, and Intern Program Coordinator.



Captain Nick Amato

Captain Vincent "Nick" Amato has served with the Beavercreek Police Department for 20 years. He oversees the Support Services Division, which includes the Communications Section, Records Section, Technical Services, and Facilities and Equipment Services. Captain Amato also serves as the Administrator for grants, training, and hiring.

Captain Shawn Sumner served with the Beavercreek Police Department for over 32 years and retired on June 14, 2024, as the Captain of the Operations Division, which includes the Patrol Section. He also served as the administrator for specialized patrol assignments, the School Resource Officer Program, and the Citizens on Preventive Patrol (COPP) volunteer program.



Karen Mahaffey, Executive Assistant

Karen Mahaffey has served with the Beavercreek Police Department for 13 years. As the Executive Assistant, she provides support to the Command Staff and manages personnel files, training records, and purchase orders. She also assists with budget management and the preparation of official documents related to the department's operations.

Operations Division

The Operations Division consists of 6 Patrol Sergeants and 34 Patrol Officers who are responsible for the protection of life and property through the enforcement of laws and ordinances for the City of Beavercreek and State of Ohio.

Officers are responsible for maintaining law and order by responding to calls for service, conducting traffic enforcement, investigating criminal activity, engaging in crime prevention activities, and conducting proactive patrols. 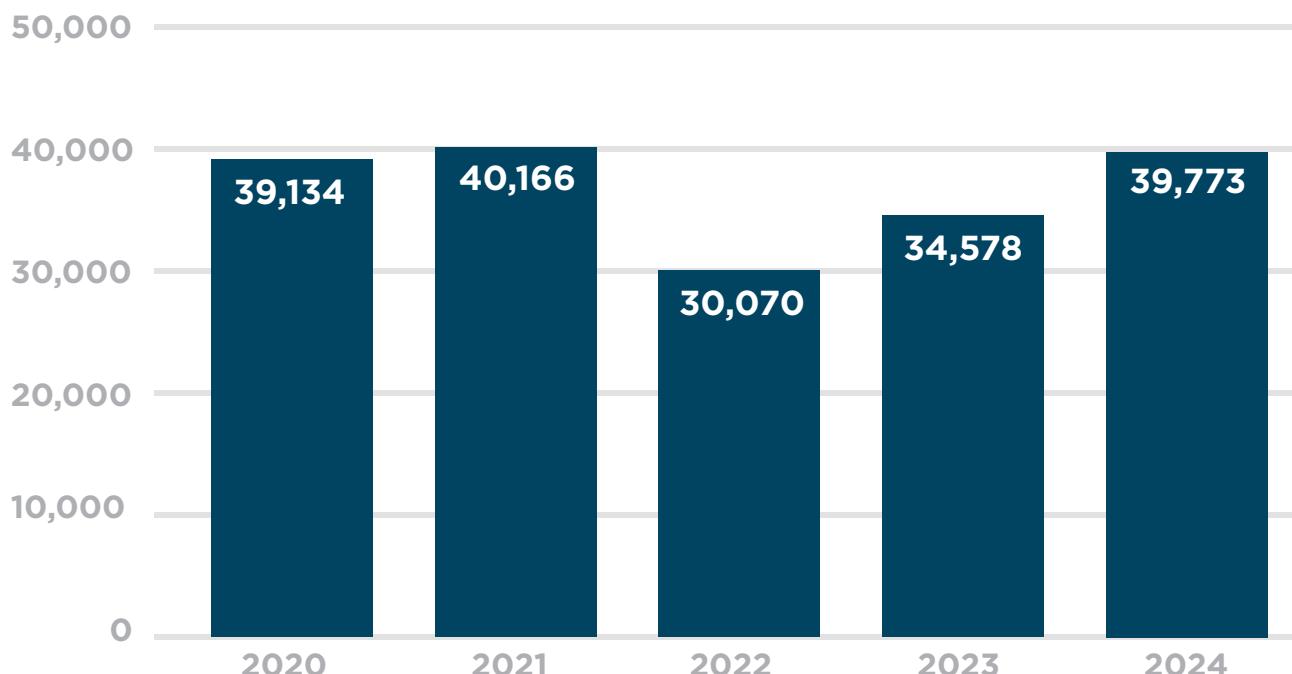

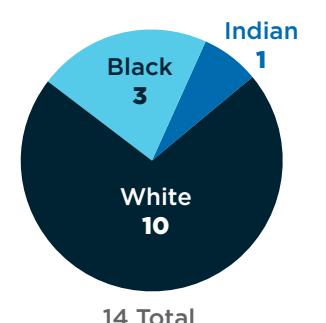

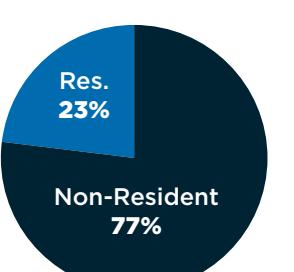
Use of Force by Race



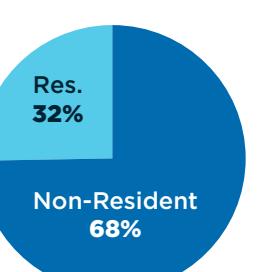
Type of Force Used

Special Services Division

The Special Services Division consists of an Administrative Sergeant, the Investigations Section and the Community Engagement Unit. The Admin Sergeant supervises four general assignment detectives, one task force detective, and the community engagement officer. Detectives are primarily responsible for conducting felony criminal investigations, collecting and developing evidence, and conducting interviews with complainants, witnesses and suspects. Detectives may also be trained in conducting polygraph exams and analyzing digital forensics.

The department's Community Engagement Officer is responsible for developing and maintaining relationships with community members, developing crime prevention and community programs, administering the department social media.

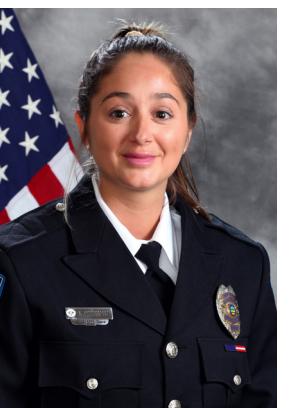

2024 Community Engagement Highlights

Staying true to the department mission, the Beavercreek Police Department's partnership with the community included many events, activities, and programs which assisted citizens, businesses, schools, and other community groups.

- Robbery Response Training with financial institutions
- ALICE training with churches and businesses
- Security assessments at residences and schools
- Safety Town: More than 250 children attended four sessions of a four-day interactive and educational experience designed for children entering kindergarten and first grade. Beavercreek officers and guest speakers provided age-appropriate instruction on a variety of topics, including traffic safety, pedestrian and bike safety, fire safety, poison prevention, animal safety, stranger awareness, school and bus safety, 911 usage, emergency preparedness, and gun safety.
- Battle of the Badges Blood Drive
- National Night Out: On August 6, 2024, the Beavercreek Police Department held its annual National Night Out, an event that promotes police-community partnerships, neighborhood safety, and camaraderie. It provides a valuable opportunity for citizens to interact with officers and learn more about crime prevention and local efforts to make Beavercreek a safer place.
- Citizens Police Academy: This free program is designed to familiarize Beavercreek residents and business owners with the policies, procedures, and services of the Beavercreek Police Department. Participants interact with officers and gain hands-on experience in a variety of law enforcement topics. In 2024, nine residents graduated as part of the 21st Citizens Police Academy (CPA) class.

The department's social media presence on Facebook, Twitter, Nextdoor, Neighbors, and Tip411 is used to provide communication, share educational information, and seek assistance from citizens to help solve crimes. Thanks to assistance from the community, approximately 70% of suspects posted on Facebook have been identified.

Support Services Division

The support services division consists of an administrative sergeant, a technical services supervisor, the communications section, the records section, and the property and resources unit.

The administrative sergeant serves as the accreditation manager and supervises the property and resources clerk.

The technical services supervisor oversees 12 communications operators and 3 records clerks, and is also responsible for managing the department's computer systems and equipment.

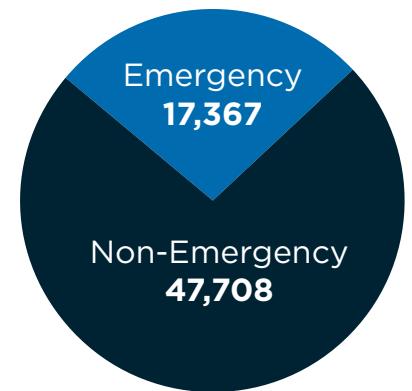

COPP volunteers perform non-enforcement duties such as patrolling Beavercreek roadways, assisting disabled motorists, directing traffic at crash scenes and community events such as the Popcorn Festival, conducting vacation house checks, and securing parks throughout the city.

The hard work and dedication of our COPP volunteers play a vital role in helping the police department fulfill its mission of working in partnership with the community and providing professional service to our residents. This program is one of the longest-running volunteer initiatives of its kind in the country, and we thank all of our volunteers for their exceptional service.

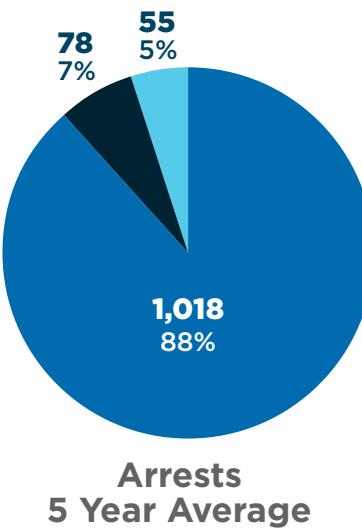
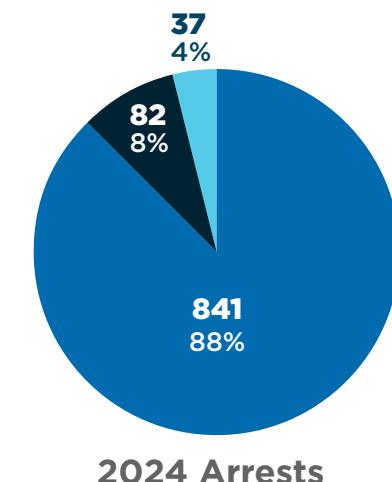


Violent and Property Crimes | 5 Year Average

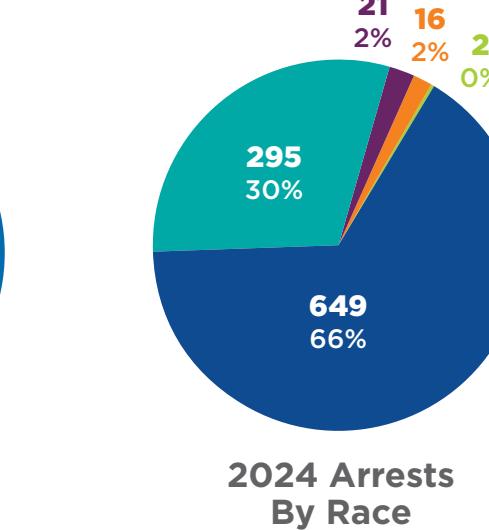


Arrests Data

Arrest Type

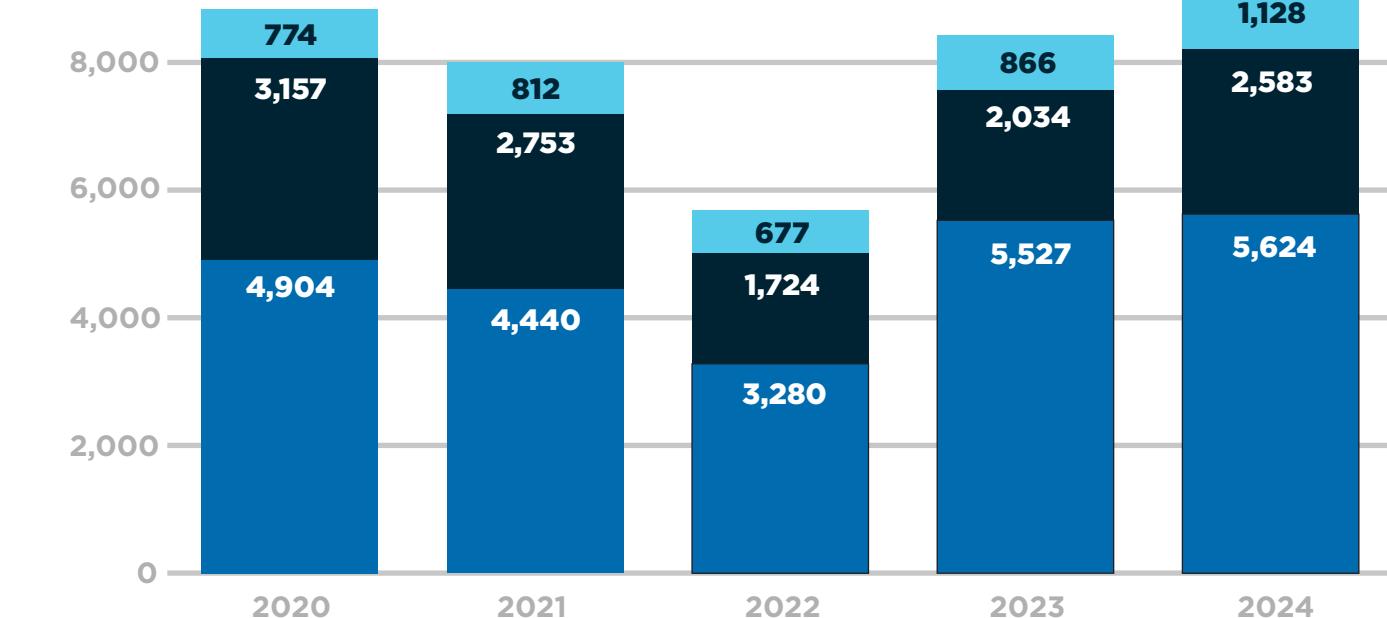


Arrest Race



Traffic Stats

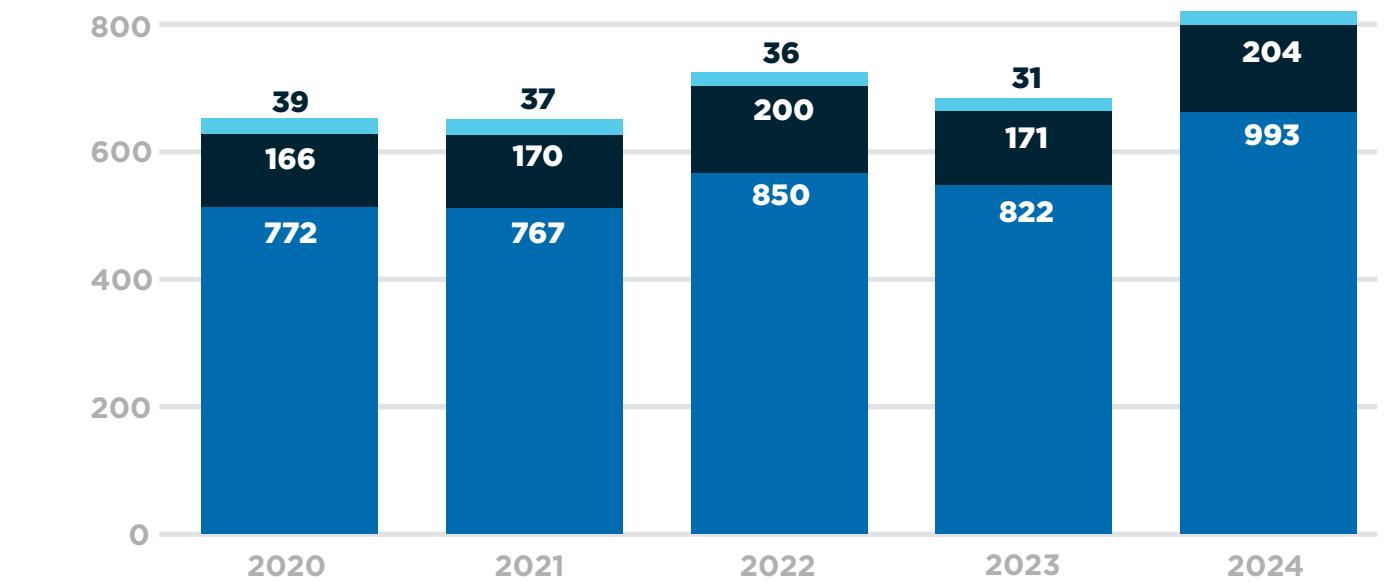
Traffic Enforcement
